SUBJECT: 2022-23 LCAP and ADOPTED BUDGET – APPROVAL

The County Superintendent of Schools is required to review and approve the district's Local Control and Accountability Plan or the annual update to an existing Local Control and Accountability Plan prior to the approval of the district's Adopted Budget [Education Code Section 42127(d)(2)].

Adopted Local Control and Accountability Plan

In accordance with California Education Code (EC) Section 52070, our office has completed its review of the district's 2022-23 Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) to determine whether it adheres to the guidelines adopted by the State Board of Education (SBE).

The district's adopted LCAP has been analyzed to determine whether:

- The plan adheres to the template adopted by the State Board of Education.
- The budget includes sufficient expenditures to implement the actions and strategies included in the plan, based on the projected costs included in the plan.
- The plan adheres to the expenditure requirements for funds apportioned on the basis of the number and concentration of unduplicated pupils.
- The plan includes the calculations to determine whether there is required carryover. If applicable, the plan includes a description of the planned uses of the specified funds and a description of how the planned uses of those funds satisfy the requirements for specific actions to be considered as contributing toward meeting the increased or improved services requirement.

The district's adopted LCAP has been analyzed in the context of the guidance provided by the California County Superintendents Educational Services Association (CCSESA) and the California Department of Education (CDE). Based on our analysis,

the district’s Local Control and Accountability Plan for the 2022-23 fiscal year has been approved by the Riverside County Superintendent of Schools. Our goal is to further enhance the performance of students by providing feedback and inquiry questions that will support your refinement of future Local Control and Accountability Plans and any additional plans designed to close the achievement gap in metrics that impact student preparedness for college and career.

Student Achievement

The purpose of the LCAP is to ensure that all students graduate from high school with the skills needed to be successful in both college and career. Riverside County Office of Education conducted a review of research on K-12 college readiness indicators to identify those that would align with the LCAP purpose and have the greatest impact. As a result of this research, we recommend that local education agencies (LEAs) closely monitor the metrics listed in the data tables below for all student groups.

We offer the following commendations and inquiry questions to consider for the implementation of the 2022-23 Local Control and Accountability Plan and the refinement of the plan in future years:

Student Success in Academics

The district is to be commended for their commitment with meeting the needs of their students during the transition from virtual to in-person instruction. A review of the local data and the California Dashboard revealed much success with Nuvview Union. Based on current local data measures to evaluate current progress, Nuvview revealed success in the following areas: ELA

showed an increase of 13.8 points resulting in the dashboard indicator moving from red to orange; English Learners' academic performance in ELA showed an increase of 12.4 points resulting in the dashboard indicator moving from orange to yellow; and improvement in the area of suspension rates for Students with Disabilities which reduced significantly.

Additional dialogue related to the questions below may support achievement of the goals and desired outcomes aligned to student academic achievement:

- How might the district make systematic use of universal screeners and diagnostics to inform best first instruction (Tier 1) in both ELA and mathematics?
- In what ways are students being monitored as they matriculate between Tier 1, Tier 2, and Tier 3 instruction?
- In what ways might the district ensure the development of strong mathematical foundations for all students, PK-8?
- How might the district monitor the time teachers have to collaborate specifically on mathematics instruction and implementing mathematics explorations that foster the Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) pipeline?

Student Access, Enrollment, and Success in Rigorous Coursework

The district is to be commended for their strong focus with providing more Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) labs across the district. In particular, there is an emphasis to enroll more unduplicated pupils in STEM labs. The district is also to be commended for ensuring data literacy for all students by sustaining a 1:1 device ratio, providing access to technology personnel, and digital tools.

Additional dialogue related to the questions below may support achievement of the goals and desired outcomes aligned to student access, enrollment, and success in rigorous coursework:

- What steps might the district take to increase teacher professional learning in computer applications?
- What enhanced effect would the district expect to see if you added the arts to the STEM efforts to create STEAM?
- In what ways can we measure student progress towards more rigorous coursework based on their participation in STEM?

Student Engagement and School Climate

The district is to be commended for its commitment to mental health, counseling, and Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) implementation as ways to strengthen student engagement to their school sites and promote a positive school climate. Specifically, the district ensured that full-time counselors were available at each school site. The district is further exploring the expansion of mental health services through partnerships with external organizations.

Additional dialogue related to the questions below may support achievement of the goals and desired outcomes aligned to student engagement and school climate:

- How might the district leverage high-engagement activities such as the arts, sports, or esports to offset high suspension rates and chronic absenteeism for the Students with Disabilities student group?
- Is the district taking full advantage of all the mental health and Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) capacities available to create maximum engagement and positive school climates?

Monitoring Progress

It is recommended that the district utilize a process that continually assesses the progress of each planned action and its effectiveness in achieving the *Desired Outcomes* related to each goal specified in the LCAP. Identifying leading indicators for progress on goals and developing a system to monitor those indicators throughout the year is encouraged. The information received from progress monitoring can support communication with stakeholders and provide information the district will need to clearly articulate, in the *Goal Analysis* section of the plan, the effectiveness of the planned actions/services.

Adopted Budget

The district's Adopted Budget was developed in the context of the Governor's 2022-23 May Revise. Subsequently, the 2022-23 State Budget was adopted, which contained significant differences from the May Revise. The district should update and revise its budget projections to reflect changes in available funding along with updating LCAP contributing actions and services to incorporate the associated increased funding.

Based on our analysis of the information submitted, and our assessment of revenue changes in the enacted State Budget, we approve the district's budget, but would like to highlight the following:

Enrollment and Average Daily Attendance (ADA) – The district estimates 1,359 ADA for the current fiscal year, or a 4.9 percent increase from the certified 2021-22 P-2 ADA. For 2023-24 the district projects a 3.7 increase in ADA and for 2024-25 the district projects a 1.9 percent increase in ADA. It will be important for the district to monitor enrollment in the current and subsequent years to ensure accurate LCFF revenue and plan accordingly.

Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) – The district's Adopted Budget included COLAs for LCFF funding of 6.56 percent, 5.38 percent, and 4.02 percent for the 2022-23, 2023-24, and 2024-25 fiscal years, respectively. Subsequent to the district's Adopted Budget approval, the 2022-23 enacted State Budget included a statutory COLA of 6.56 percent with an additional 6.28 percent increase to the LCFF base grants for the current fiscal year. The enacted State Budget also included a 2021-22 ADA relief provision. We encourage the district to update its projection of available LCFF funding provided by the enacted state budget.

Unrestricted Deficit Spending – The district’s Adopted Budget indicates a positive ending balance for all funds in the 2022-23 fiscal year. However, for the unrestricted General Fund, the district anticipates expenditures and uses will exceed revenues and sources by \$293,560 in 2022-23 and \$21,749 in 2023-24.

Employee Negotiations – As of the board date, June 13, 2022, the district reports salary and benefit negotiations continue with both the certificated and classified bargaining units for the 2022-23 fiscal year. Prior to entering into a written agreement, California Government Code (GC) Section 3547.5 requires a public school employer to publicly disclose the major provisions of a collective bargaining agreement, including but not limited to, the costs incurred in the current and subsequent fiscal years. The disclosure must include a written certification signed by the district superintendent and chief business official that the district can meet the costs incurred by the district during the term of the agreement. Therefore, please make available to the public and submit a disclosure to our office at least ten (10) working days prior to the date on which the governing board is to take action on a proposed agreement.

Reserve for Economic Uncertainties – The minimum state-required reserve for a district of Nuvview Union School District’s size is 3.0 percent. However, the governing board requires the district maintain a 10.0 percent reserve for economic uncertainties. In light of the current fiscal environment, our office recommends districts maintain reserves higher than the minimum and commends the district’s board for this fiscally prudent practice. The district projects to meet the minimum reserve requirement, and board required reserve, in the current and two subsequent fiscal years.

Cash Management – Attention to cash solvency remains a critical fiscal practice and should continue to be prioritized in the coming year. The district projects sufficient cash balances to cover projected expenditures during the 2022-23 fiscal year. Should the district identify the need for temporary borrowing options, our office strongly advises districts to consult with legal counsel and independent auditors prior to using Cafeteria Special Revenue Fund (Fund 13) and Building Fund (Fund 21) for temporary interfund borrowing purposes to remedy cash shortfalls.

AB 2756 – Current law, as enacted through AB 2756 (Chapter 52, Statutes of 2004), requires the County Superintendent to review and consider any studies, reports, evaluations, or audits that may contain evidence a district is showing fiscal distress. Our office did not receive any such reports for the district.

Conclusion
